

## **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

Bornean Sun Bear Conservation Centre (BSBCC) was established in 2008 as a collaborative project between Sabah Forestry Department (SFD), Sabah Wildlife Department (SWD), Land Empowerment Animals People (LEAP) and Malaysian sun bear researcher Wong Siew Te.

Located at Sepilok, near Sandakan on Sabah's east coast, the Centre aims to carry out sun bear conservation, education, research and rehabilitation and provide an improved long term living environment for confiscated bears that cannot be released back into the wild. The Centre has capacity for 40 bears in two bear houses as well as a quarantine building. A total of 37 bears were housed at BSBCC by the end of 2015.

Major milestones during the year included the completion of a second main forest enclosure comprising four forested pens, as well as the first release of one of BSBCC's sun bears to the wild, when 5-year-old female Natalie was released into Tabin Wildlife Reserve on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2015.

Visitors numbers continued to rise, with BSBCC receiving more than 51,000 visitors in 2015 compared to 48,506 the previous year.

## **2.0 OPERATIONS**

#### **BSBCC Board of Directors**

During 2015 BSBCC's board of directors comprised Wong Siew Te (Founder and CEO of BSBCC), Mr. Frederick Kugan (Deputy Director of SFD) and Mr. Augustine Tuuga (Deputy Director of SWD).

#### **Meetings with Partners**

Throughout the year, meetings were held with partners SFD and SWD, on 10<sup>th</sup> March, 2<sup>nd</sup> July and 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2015.

#### Staffing

Four new staff joined the BSBCC team during 2015. The following table shows the list of new staff at BSBCC.

### **BSBCC Organization Chart 2015**




Chart 1: BSBCC staff organization chart at the end of 2015

Two staff left BSBCC in 2015, Mohd. Rizan bin Osman (Finance and Human Resource Executive) and Tan Wei Cheng (Centre Coordinator).

At the end of 2015, BSBCC had 21 staff. Additional new staff greatly helped in the daily operations of the Centre, including management, maintenance of facilities, bear husbandry and educational activities.

## **3.0 SUN BEARS**

## **Bear Arrivals**

A total of 6 bears were sent to BSBCC in 2015. Two new bears arrived at the Centre on 15<sup>th</sup> January 2015. Montom (a 3 year old male) was rescued from

Kota Marudu while Kala (a 3 month old female) was rescued from Kalabakan. In August 2015, sun bear cub Tan-Tan was brought to BSBCC, having been put up for sale by poachers and rescued by a member of the public who bought her and sent her to SWD. On 31st October 2015, two more new bears arrived at the Centre, both rescued from Singgaron village, Ranau. These two new bears were Boboi (1 year old male) and Kitud (1 year old female). At the end of the year, Teddy (13 year old female) arrived at BSBCC. She was rescued from the Wilmar Sapi Plantation Mini Zoo in Telupid. Health checks were conducted for the newly arrived bears and all were guarantined for a month before being integrated with existing bears. Details of the new bears are as follows:

#### **Sun Bear Reintroduction**

Five year-old female sun bear Natalie was reintroduced to the wild on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2015. She was released in Tabin Wildlife Reserve, Lahad Datu after 5 years of rehabilitation at the Centre. Natalie had built up her survival skills and independence and learned to behave like a wild sun bear. Her improvement in her survival skills in the forest enclosure was excellent and she was an exceptional climber and tree nest maker.

Natalie was fitted with a satellite collar to keep track of her after her release

Aerospace Sdn. Bhd. was used to transport her into the forest. This was the first time that a captive sun bear has been reintroduced to its natural habitat in Sabah using such facilities. The total cost for reintroduction was RM45,781.70.

The first two months of GPS satellite data showed Natalie moving around in the forest. However from 16<sup>th</sup> July - 9<sup>th</sup> August 2015 (25 days), the data showed an unvarying location. A team of 7 ground crew (3 staff from WRU, 3 from BSBCC and 1 from Scuba Zoo) was sent into Tabin Wildlife Reserve and on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of searching, they found the collar. There was no damage on the collar and no signs of bear mortality within a 20km radius, implying that Natalie's collar had simply fallen off.

### **Bear Deaths**

In 2015, BSBCC lost two bears - Tokob, a 12 year old female and Bongkud, a 5 year old female. Tokob died on 26<sup>th</sup> April 2015, due to severe lung failure, while Bongkud died on 13<sup>th</sup> July after being struck by lightning during a storm.

## 4.0 VOLUNTEERS & INTERNS

#### **Bear Action Teams (BATs)**

In 2015, 3 BATs groups worked at BSBCC. All teams came through Outlook Expeditions. The BATs groups helped to build a mini observation platform outside pen A and repaired existing perimeter walkways outside pens C and D. The outside perimeter trails are used regularly by BSBCC staff to feed and bears monitor the the forest in enclosures and for enclosure

maintenance. The steps mini and observation platform helped in conducting rehabilitation work more conveniently around the facilities. Projects were monitored by BSBCC and Arkitrek staff. The following are the details of BATs group in 2015:

#### **Volunteer Programme**

BSBCC also worked with APE Malaysia on the BSBCC volunteer programme which helps to meet the needs of the Centre in providing care for the rescued sun bears, facility maintenance and education awareness. A total of 31 individual volunteers from 6 countries worked at the Centre under this programme in 2015 (See Appendix I).

#### Interns

BSBCC encourages students from local and international institutions to do their internship at the Cenmtre. Interns can gain experience in conservation on the ground while helping the Centre in caring for the sun bears as well as in the education awareness programme. In 2015, a total of 13 interns from 4 institutions were recruited (See Appendix II).

# 5.0 INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT & MAINTENANCE

## **Completion of 2<sup>nd</sup> Forest Enclosure**

The construction of the 2<sup>nd</sup> main forest commenced enclosure which in November 2014 was completed on 11<sup>th</sup> June 2015. The enclosure is adjacent to the 2<sup>nd</sup> bear house and comprises four forested pens. Fencing of the enclosure was funded by Sime Darby Foundation. The 1 ha enclosure is also equipped with boardwalks between and outside each pen for maintenance and rehabilitation work. These additional pens allow more bears to go out into the forest at any one time.

## **Construction of Aerial Walkway** and 2<sup>nd</sup> Observation Platform

Construction of a new aerial walkway and a 2<sup>nd</sup> observation platform to view the bears commenced in September 2015, funded by Sime Darby Foundation. BSBCC receives an average of approximately 4,000 visitors per month and this additional structure will allow BSBCC to cater for a greater number of visitors. The facilities are expected to be completed by March 2016.

## **Outdoor Storage Shed**

An outdoor storage shed was constructed by BSBCC staff outside the first bear house. The storage shed was built to provide additional space for storage of tools for the Centre's facility maintenance.

## **Upgrading of Pen D**

Due to excessive digging by bears in the slope area of pen D, a retaining wall was built to prevent further soil erosion. At the same time, a pool was also constructed inside the enclosure for the sun bears to cool themselves during hot weather. The upgrading of pen D was completed on  $17^{th}$  May.

### **Tree Removal Operation**

Two trees struck by lightning near the observation platform had to be removed for the safety of the bears, staff and visitors to the Centre. The tree cutting operation was conducted by SFD. Another dead tree in pen C was also removed for safety purposes. All felled trees were left in the pens as enrichment for the sun bears.

# 6.0 VISITOR CENTRE OPERATIONS

### **Visitor Summary**

Since opening to the public in 2014, BSBCC has become one of the main tourism destinations in Sandakan. Apart from achieving BSBCC's aim to promote awareness about sun bears, opening our doors to the public has also financially supported the Centre.

In 2015, the total number of visitors was 51,858 of which just under half, (24,628), were Malaysians. Visitors from the United Kingdom (9,230), Australia (5,281) and United States (1,504) comprised the top three overseas countries. (See Appendix III). The month of August saw the highest number of visitors, and January the lowest.

## **Notable Visitors**

#### President and CEO of Columbus Zoo

BSBCC welcomed the President and CEO of Columbus Zoo and his team on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2015. Columbus Zoo in the USA has been a great support towards BSBCC since our establishment and it was our pleasure to have them visiting the Centre.

#### Director of Sabah Wildlife Department

On 27<sup>th</sup> April, the new Director of SWD Tn. William Baya visited BSBCC, along with the general manager of Rasa Ria Resort Mr. Jean-Michel, Mr. Sail Jamaludin, Dr. Sen Nathan and Dr. Toshinor Tsubouchi. Mr. Wong gave a brief talk and guided the VIPs on a tour to the observation platform.




Chart 2: Monthly visitor numbers to BSBCC

# 7.0 EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

#### **Group Visits**

BSBCC welcomes group visits to the Centre to encourage awareness about sun bears both locally and internationally. This year, **BSBCC** received a total of 42 group visits from local and international schools and institutions, as well as clubs and government and non-government organizations, comprising a total of 1,706 people. (See Appendix IV).

## **Exhibitions**

BSBCC participated in educational exhibitions in several events during 2015. Educational specimens were displayed and BSBCC merchandise was sold during these events. Brochures and booklets were also distributed to the public.

#### **Outreach Programme**

In 2015 BSBCC visited a total of 19 schools comprising 12 primary schools and 5 secondary schools within the Sabah districts of Sandakan, Kinabatangan, Lahad Datu and Pitas. Programmes were conducted in collaboration with HUTAN-Kinabatangan

Orangutan Conservation Programme, SWD, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) Sandakan, Sandakan Borneo Bird Club as well as individual volunteer Ms. Julia Morse, a Mentor from the British Council. More than 3,617 students and teachers participated in the programme conducted throughout the year. We would like to thank every school we visited and the district education offices for their support in our outreach activities, as well as the GEF Small Grants Programme for supporting our education activities. (See Appendix V).

#### **Taxidermy Workshop**

BSBCC together with Sabah Parks carried out a taxidermy workshop on sun bear specimens at Kinabalu Park on 17<sup>th</sup> – 20<sup>th</sup> August 2015. Three BSBCC staff were involved: Gloria, Lin May and Jeremy. A total of 8 sun bear specimens were transported to Sabah Park's Kinabalu Park substation for the taxidermy work. These specimens were prepared for educational display for the Centre, as well as for displays at the Sabah Parks stations' galleries. A completed specimen of an adult female sun bear was transported back to BSBCC on 26<sup>th</sup> October 2015. Special thanks to San Diego Zoo for funding the logistics of the workshop and Sabah Parks for organising the workshop.

#### Visit to Balikpapan, Indonesia

BSBCC's education team visited Kalimantan on 3<sup>rd</sup> April Balikpapan, 2015. The town has adopted the sun bear as its official mascot, following interest in and attention from the local media on Gabriella Frederiksson's research on sun bears. Kawasan Wisata Perlindungan Lingkungan Hidup (KWPLH) founded by Gabriella is a sun bear education centre in Balikpapan. The well established education centre is complete with an education exhibit and an elevated walkway for visitors to see sun bears in a forest enclosure. It was an inspiring experience for the BSBCC education team to learn about the establishment of this centre. The trip was made possible with support from San Diego Zoo.

### Production of Education Materials

Through funding from the GEF Small Grants Programme and collaboration with the University of the Sunshine Coast, Australia, booklets, brochures, posters and mobile education displays were produced in 2015. Awareness on sun bears can be promoted further through distribution of brochures and booklets to visitors at the Centre, during outreach programmes and exhibitions.

# 8.0 Research Projects

# Sun Bear Behaviour & Conservation

BSBCC is working with the University of Portsmouth to carry out research on sun bear behaviour and conservation. The main aim of the project is to improve the sun bear rehabilitation and reintroduction to the forest. Research assistants and students from the University started to conduct their research in 2015.

## Thermoregulation and Activity Profile of Sun Bears in Captivity

This research was carried out at BSBCC by professors and students from the University of the Sunshine Coast, Australia and University of Wyoming, USA from 9<sup>th</sup> - 20<sup>th</sup> February 2015.

# **9.0 FINANCIAL SUMMARY**

## Funding

BSBCC received funding from various organizations and individuals through donations, fundraisers, grants, volunteering programmes and adoption programmes, and also from ticketing and merchandise sales, enabling BSBCC to continue its operations throughout the year. The total funds raised in 2015 was RM1,828,261.54. The chart below shows the proportion of funds raised from various sources. Most funds were generated from ticket sales (46%). followed funds received for by infrastructure development from




Chart 3: Funds raised in 2015

Sime Darby Foundation (29%) and donations (13%), including funds generated from adoption and volunteer programmes.

#### **BSBCC** adoption programme

In 2015 BSBCC's sun bear adoption programme generated a total of RM62,814.00 through 156 purchases of "Gifts with Meaning", 81 adoptions through the "Share Bear" programme and 2 adoptions through the "My Bear" programme. The public can support BSBCC through the adoption programme directly when visiting the Centre as well as through BSBCC's website.

#### Sime Darby Foundation

Sime Darby Foundation generously funded the construction of the second observation platform and aerial walkway with a grant of RM870,700.00.

#### The GEF Small Grants Programme

Funds from the GEF Small Grants Programme (GEF SGP) for a total of USD48,460.00 enabled BSBCC to produce signboards, brochures and booklets as well as conduct education programmes around the state. BSBCC has extended the period of the grant which will end in September 2016 to conduct further educational activities.

#### San Diego Zoo

Through funding from San Diego Zoo, BSBCC was able to produce education materials including booklets, a mounted sun bear specimen and a sun bear costume. The funding of RM17,070.40 also enabled BSBCC to conduct a survey on visitors' knowledge on sun bears during their visit to the Centre as well as for BSCCC staff to visit a sun bear sanctuary in Balikpapan, Kalimantan.

#### **Expenses**

The expenses incurred for 2015 totaled RM1,884,416.16 of which most was for

the Centre's operations (51%), followed by the construction of the  $2^{nd}$  forest enclosure (26%) and construction of the aerial walkway and  $2^{nd}$  observation platform (9%). See Appendix VII for financial summary details. The operation expenses included staff salaries, bear food and medication, education activities and facility maintenance.




Chart 4: BSBCC expenses in 2015

# **10.0 PUBLIC AWARENESS**

## Blogs, Website & Facebook

#### Blogs

The Bornean Sun Bear blog, sunbears.wildlifedirect.org which was established by Wong in May 2008, continued to run successfully throughout 2015. Contributions to the blog were made by the BSBCC team and individual volunteers, providing a lively and up to date chronicle of the development of BSBCC. The blog also served as a spread information means to and awareness about sun bear conservation in general.

#### Website

BSBCC's website on www.bsbcc.org.mv was launched in 2013. The website features information and news updates about sun bears as well as BSBCC's operations. Newsletters and annual reports, and education materials are made available for download through the website. Information on how people can help through BSBCC volunteer programme, adoption programme and online donations are also available. This year the BSBCC website was redesigned with help from the University of the Sunshine Coast, Australia.

#### **BSBCC Facebook Page**

BSBCC Facebook page www.facebook.com/sunbear.bsbcc/ which was launched in 2012 was continuously updated throughout 2015. Articles and photos on sun bears and the Centre's activities were regularly posted on the page to update BSBCC's supporters on the development of BSBCC.

#### **Newsletter – Sun Bear Voice**

BSBCC's newsletter "Sun Bear Voice" was published online throughout the year. A total of 6 newsletters were made downloadable online through BSBCC's website. Copies of the newsletters were also produced for in house reading at the visitor Centre.

# Sun bear returned to natural habitat

SANDAKAN : A sun bear found abandoned as a cub in the forest, was returned to its natural habitat deep in a wildlife reserve near Lahad Datu over the weekend, a first for the Bornean Sun Bear Conservation Centre (BSBCC). Natalie became the first rescued bear to be released to the wild since the centre started receiving and caring for orphaned and rescued sun bears seven years ago.

The BSBCC and Sabah Wildlife Department are monitoring Natalie's movements and progress at the Tabin Wildlife Reserve through a satellite collar fitted on her, after she was airlifted by a helicopter from Layang-Layang Aerospace Sdn Bhd into the interior of the protected area, away from settlements and oil palm plantations.

and oil palm plantations. BSBCC's chief executive officer and founder, Wong Siew Te, said Natalie, who was surrendered to the Sabah Wildlife Department in Lahad Datu by a local in December 2010, has matured into a healthy young adult under our care.

Wong said Natalie was about three months old when she arrived at the centre, and that it was suspected that, like so many other bear cubs, her mother was killed by a poacher and she was captured to be kept illegally as a pet, although the person who surrendered her claimed she was found abandoned in the forest.

"She has grown well into adulthood at our centre for over four years. We walked with her in the forest (in Sepilok) during her first year. Such walks are an important part of the rehabilitation process of rescued pet sun bears so that they can learn to live like wild bears by developing essential survival skills like foraging, climbing, nest building and socialising. "Natalie grew up in natural forest en-

He said the release of Natalie was a joint effort of BSBCC, Sabah Wildlife Department and the Wildlife Rescue Unit (WRU), Danau Girang Field Centre, and thanked the head of WRU, Dr. Sen Nathan and veterinarians, Drs Laura Benedict and Diana Ramirez for their dedication in helping sun bears and the release work.

Department director, William Baya commended BSBCC for the courageous effort in initiating the release project. "The release of Natalie is a sign of

"The release of Natalie is a sign of BSBCC's success and I believe more bears will be released into the wild in the near future," William said.

future," William said. Meanwhile, Wong stressed that BSBCC aims to protect sun bears through a holistic approach that incorporates improvement of animal welfare for captive bears, education, research and rehabilitation.

He said BSBCC has worked closely with the Sabah Wildlife Department, Sabah Forestry Department and nongovernmental organisation Land Empowerment Animals People (LEAP) to achieve these four objectives. He also thanked funders and support-

He also thanked funders and supporters including the Sabah State Government, Tourism Ministry of Malaysia and Sime Darby Foundation, and many more from across Malaysia and the world without whom BSBCC's work would not be possible.

Sun bears are a Totally Protected Species under the Sabah Wildlife Conservation Enactment 1997. Any offenders who are found guilty of harming, keeping sun bears, or possessing sun bear parts are subject to imprisonment of five years and a fine of RM50,000, or both. In addition, killing of a sun bear has a mandatory jail sentence of no less than six months but not exceeding 5 years. The public is urged to report to the department or BSBCC if they come across any illegal acts involving sun bears. *Coverage of Natalie's return to the forest. Daily Express, 26 May 2015.*
